EYFS Curriculum

The EYFS curriculum is first and foremost the EYFS Statutory
Framework. The Framework sets out *The Three Characteristics of Effective Learning* (How children learn) and the *7 Key Areas of Learning* (What children learn.)
Early Years Practitioners also use Development Matters to inform planning and assessment.

The 7 Key Areas of Learning are divided into two categories 'Prime Areas' and 'Specific Areas':

The Prime Areas:

- Communication and Language
- Personal, Social and Emotional Development
- 3. Physical Development

The Four specific areas:

- 1. Literacy
- 2. Maths
- 3. Understanding the world
- 4. Expressive art and design

Sensory play is an essential part of young children's development. It is any activity that stimulates their senses – touch, sight, hearing, smell and taste. It helps children interact with and make sense of the world that surrounds them. Through sensory play, children develop curiosity, initiative, focus and persistence. Sensory play activities are; playdough, painting, baking, an obstacle course, playing with; sand, water, food, mud and so much more!

Sensory play is still a very important part of our development and learning.




Water play also supports the teaching of capacity and volume
